2. OF INTEREST

2.1 PHB D Block Basecamp Report – February 2019 – Sarah Shoemith

“A ship in harbour is safe - but that is not what ships are built for.”

— John A. Shedd, *Salt from My Attic*

Indeed, you can get to see how strong, creative, resilient, humorous and gutsy boys really are when they are outside – doing what young boys can do best – building rafts, making fires, shooting targets with pellet guns, abseiling off rock faces and scrambling up kopjes to observe the views below.

Even the boys surprised themselves on this Basecamp and were ‘better ships that they ever imagined’ – some enjoyed camping for the first time, walked further than they thought they could, cooked their own supper on an open fire, ate no tuck for a few days (and survived), learnt knots and how to make shelters! Some new friendships were established, new opinions and perspectives were aired and these were peppered with ‘boyish’ arguments on just about anything - just for the sake of it! Wandering down a pathway in the middle of the miombo woodland, with a rucksack on their back and the afternoon sun on their faces lead to many special conversations happening, where they talked about family, future dreams, their old schools, girls, cars, gaming and most importantly – food! These ‘ships’ were now ‘out of the harbour’ and exploring the world around them in the fresh air.

Outward Bound Zimbabwe successfully orchestrated many of the activities that these boys did in and around Calderwood Park. Their Instructors are trained to keep the boys as safe as possible during these

activities and then to tease out the learning points and relevance of what they are doing as they work in various magical outdoor ‘classrooms’. If you were to crouch down in the circle besides the boys after such activities, you would be amazed at the conversations that they are having – sometimes, they are talking openly and telling their friends some real home truths, sometimes you see the empathy start to flow and there are often times when they are rolling around in the dust belly laughing at one another’s experiences together.

Basecamp is a really special way of introducing the Peterhouse Outdoor Education Program which gets more and more challenging as the boys get older each year. We thank the Peterhouse Tutors and Outward Bound Zimbabwe Instructors for every moment they spent with the D Block – helping them become more self-aware and ‘ready’ for the open seas of life around them.

2.2 Archery at Peterhouse

This Club welcomes new members all the time. It is a fantastic skill and members have great opportunities to represent their country if they reach National levels. We have monthly Interschool competitions at various schools around the Harare. All equipment and spare parts for this Club come from South Africa. Therefore, in order to be part of this Club, members will have to pay a small amount in US\$ every term. Parents of the members will receive an individual letter advising them of this nominal fee.

2.3 Conservation

Gosho and Calderwood Parks

We have finally had some good rain in the parks to bring the water table up and our animals are doing well. Season tickets are available (which cover both parks) from Peterhouse Girls which enable multiple entry for the year. For those who have not been into Calderwood Park – it is worth a visit – we have zebra, eland, wildebeest, kudu as well as smaller antelope and there is now a road network with a map which can be collected at the gate and several picnic sites. Please make payments at the Peterhouse Boys main gate before you go to the entrance. Does anyone know of anywhere on the Highveld where we could buy some waterbuck or anyone who is looking to buy zebra?

School Assembly Address 12 February 2019 – Mission Week

*Stand up, stand up for Jesus! You soldiers of the cross,
Lift high His royal banner, it must not suffer loss:
From victory unto victory, His army shall He lead,
Till every foe is vanquished, and Christ is Lord indeed.*

Words by George Duffield.

So it's Mission Week and the theme is *Therefore Stand*; that's why I've just read Verse 1 of Hymn 677 to you. There are, by the way three more verses, all of which carry on in similar vein.

The message in those words is clear enough, as indeed is the theme for Mission Week – stand up for Jesus and you will be victorious and join Him in eternity. It's powerful, is it not, and I commend our Chaplain for coming up with it for Mission Week.

The theme, by the way is based not on Hymn 677 but on Ephesians Chapter 6 vs10 and 11

Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armour of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes. Those verses from Ephesians do, of course, resonate with the words of Hymn 677. It's all about putting on the armour of the Gospel and standing up for Jesus.

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I must confess that I find Mission Week particularly challenging, not because of the disruption it causes to our school routines, which is somewhat inconvenient though not critical at this time of year and not because of the gauntlet set before us by the Chaplain and the Mission Week team...the gauntlet that is the test we are set throughout the week to embrace our faith with genuine commitment and purpose; no I find Mission Week a challenge because the style simply isn't me. I err towards great organ music (Bach and Widor) and Victorian anthems (Parry and Stamford), glorious hymns like *Guide me, O thou Great Redeemer*, formal well-structured and well-written prayers and anything but the strumming of a guitar; during Mission Week I'm out of my comfort zone...I have to deal with extemporised make-it-up-as-you-go-along prayers; informal gatherings; sing alongs to music I don't know; arm waving; shouts of *Halleluiahs*; and worst of all hymns like the ghastly *Thank you for Saving me*. No, I like formal, standoffish worship; structure and decorum; ideally with incense and bowing to the high altar – good old Anglo Catholicism, for those of you who know what I mean.

Of course, style of worship is ultimately of little importance which is why I pretty much give the Chaplain *carte blanche* in the chapel; that is his part of ship; there, he is in charge, not me, and if he wants it to be evangelical in approach, particularly during the course of Mission Week, then so be it...but don't ask me to like it. Oh for a sung Eucharist or better still choral evensong with Stamford in C for the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis and Charles Wood's *O Thou the central Orb* for the anthem. If all this sounds like a load of gobbledygook just put it down to the fact that, unlike the Chaplain, I'm English, I went to a posh public school and I kind of like stuffiness.

So Mission Week is a challenge for me but, perhaps, for the wrong reasons. I hope it will be a challenge for you too but preferably for the right reasons; in other words not because of the style of worship – the happy clappy, which you probably like anyway – but because you will be challenged to think carefully and

critically about your faith; you will be challenged to question what it really means to be a Christian; you will be challenged to think deeply about how you behave; you will be challenged to put your money where your mouth is and to live up to those Christian values which you proclaim on a regular basis in chapel, centrally placed at the heart of the school for good reason; and you will be challenged to embrace words which are at the top of our new Code of Honour, which not I nor the Chaplain, but our School Prefects came up with. Point 1 reads:

Peterhouse boys will be true to the principles of the Christian faith.

If you all did that the other nine points of the Code of Honour would be absolutely irrelevant.

Just imagine what could be done here at Peterhouse if you all really mean what you will say over the next week or so during Mission Week. It's no use shouting *Halleluiah* and then shouting profanities on the touchline; it's no use piously professing your faith during chapel services and behaving like a scallywag elsewhere; it's no use rising to the challenge of those verses from Ephesians Chapter 6 vs10 and 11 (*Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armour of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes*) for Mission Week only; your commitment needs to be much longer lasting if it to mean anything.

I'm keeping a diary whilst I'm here as Rector; something I should have done throughout my time as a Headmaster elsewhere too. My entry for Sunday 13 January 2013 reads as follows:

Eucharist at 8.00am and about ¾ of the boys receive the sacrament; I wonder which ones to whom I am offering the bread are the bullies and which ones are the victims.

I know we've moved on a long way since 2013 but I trust you get my drift.

Bravo for Mission Week, for Ryan Torrie our Chaplain, for Shakes Mpufu his football playing, brown shoes with a pin striped suit wearing, Frisbee throwing assistant and the Mission Week team for all that they will do over the next seven days. I will leave it to them to spread the word, the gospel, because they are better qualified than me to do so. But I do have something to contribute as Mission Week is launched: my message to you is simple – what you will do and say this week will count for nothing if you say it and do it without sincerity.
